

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Native Range Report

In 2009 the New Mexico Section invited John Romero and Wilbur Louis to make a presentation on the Sedillo Cattle Association's Rangeland operation at the Producer's Forum and Society's Annual Meeting in Albuquerque. This started a chain of events between the Sedillo Association and the New Mexico Section.

News of the relationship spread rapidly (Thanks to Jim Thorpe) with the Wall Street Journal covering the SRM's tour of the Sedillo Range Management Unit. The Society's Board of Directors heard of the relationship and the activities in New Mexico. Recognizing that there are millions of acres of rangelands on Indian Reservations and that SRM is a limited player, it recognized an opportunity and perhaps a need for more SRM participation with Native American rangeland interests. Thus, it launched a new effort called "Native Range."

The idea was to set up a working group of interested individuals to look into the situation and help determine if there is a desire for more SRM participation on rangelands used by Native Americans and if the Society has a desire to further participate on the Native Range. Of course the information flow would be a two way street with knowledge and experience flowing both ways.

A brief coordination meeting was held in Denver prior to the annual meeting. Individuals who had indicated an interest were invited. It was decided to pursue the following three objectives over the next year:

- 1) Test the water to see if a Native Range Seminar could be held at the Billings Meeting in 2011. Include a tour of one of the nearby Indian Reservations.
- 2) Look into a program that would link Indian Schools to a University with a Range Management Program. Additionally, see if graduates could then go onto an intern job with land management agencies.
- 3) Look into activities and relationships that could be developed on Native Range at the Section level. Due to the level of activity in New Mexico and the number of Native American Section Members in New Mexico, Bob Alexander was asked to facilitate discussions with Native Americans and the Section.

From: Trail Boss's Cowboy Cookbook, 1985

Shelly (Jackson) Van Haur, Van Haur Polled Herfords

Montana Beef Pasties (Butte Pasties)

- | | |
|--|-------------------------|
| 1 double recipe for pie dough | 1 c. |
| leftover gravy | |
| 1 lb. diced, cooked roast beef (3-4 c.) | 1 tsp. salt |
| ½ lb. diced, cooked (boiled or baked) potatoes | ¼ tsp. pepper |
| 1 lge. Onion, diced | ½ tsp. dried garlic |
| 3 diced carrots | 2 tbsps. parsley flakes |



Mix all ingredients in a large bowl except pie dough. Roll pie dough into 1/8 " thick, 8" round circles. Place ¾ or 1 c. of meat mixture on half of dough circle, bring other half over and seal edges. Put small slit in top of each pastie. Cook at 400° for 1 hour. Serve with gravy or catsup.

Background: The old Welch miners were known for their lunch of pasties they took down in the mines of Butte, Montana. Later these pasties took on a variety of different ingredients and styles according to the nationality of the miner's wife who made them, and later the ranch wives.
